**WASHINGTON COUNTY.** Boundaries—North by Iron, east by Kan south by Territory of Arizona, and west by the State of Nevada. This county is in the southwestern extremity of the Territory, bordering on Arizona. The eastern part is mountainous, but there is much fine productive land in the county. Cotton is raised with great success in the vicinity of Virgin and Santa Clara rivers, and tobacco and tropical fruits thrive and yield abundant crops. The average yield of grain per acre is not as large as in the more northern counties. In 1860, there were 2,781 acres under cultivation, of which 790 were in wheat, and 500 in fruit. Number of mills: saw six; grist, two. County seat, St. George.
