


President's Message


As President of the St. George Lions I am proud to welcome our many friends to the 50th Annual Lion's Dixie Roundup.

Rodeo Producer

"SWANNY" KERBY

Bar T Down Rodeo

D.A. "Swanny" Kerby started out producing rodeos by himself in 1945 with one county fair. In the 35 years which have followed, his involvement has expanded so that he now produces an average of 25 rodeos a year over a five-state region.

Kerby produced the Salt Lake City rodeo in 1984 which had an estimated attendance of more than 70,000. In addition to such large contests, the rodeo company has also handled small rodeos such as Fort Duchesne, Utah which hosted 2,500 fans. Kerby also produced college and high school rodeos in 1983

Bar T Down Rodeos is headquartered in downtown Salt Lake City. The stock is actually kept on 250 acres (both leased and owned) in the northern portion of the

Swanny's wife, Verda, is an integral part of the rodeo company as are both their son and daughter-in-law. Verda provides her services as rodeo secretary and timer; son Bud helps with production and is also a pickup man; daughter-in-law Evelyn is also both a timer and rodeo secretary. The rodeo portion of the company employs about ten people. Swanny also is in livestock speculation, buying and selling livestock, and trucking for hire.

One of the "old timers" in stock contracting circles, "the man in the white western hat" has had stock selected for the prestigious National Finals since it started in 1959. More than 200 Kerby animals have been seen in the Finals competition in those twenty years. The Wilderness Circuit has also recognized Kerby's quality stock in at least three separate years, for animals such as "Alley Cat," the bareback horse which has also won recognition as part of the top bucking stock at the NFR. Swanny says "Alley Cat" is definitely his best bareback horse.

Swanny prefers to purchase all of his stock rather than to raise it himself. He makes at least eighteen trips during the year to do so, far more than many stock contractors. He seeks his stock in seven different states, even traveling as far as Florida annually. It isn't surprising that he logs at least 18,000 miles for his efforts.

One of the problems, he says, is that there are "no Brahma-crossed cattle in our area (Utah)" and so he has to go far to find them. Swanny agrees that the bucking horse population is also decreasing, and part of this is due to the fact that "too many horses are being slaughtered." The average price he pays for a bucking horse is \$500, the average for a bull is \$1,500. The most he has ever paid for a bucking animal was \$3,500.



The Saga of the Dixie Sun Bowl


The St. George Lions Club is celebrating the advent of the 50th Anniversary of the chartering of the civic organization during 1984. The Charter of the club was presented to them on the 13th day of November, 1934, and the following names are on the charter:



From this early beginning the St. George Lions roster has expanded to over 100 active members all engaged in promoting the service projects for which Lions International is noted. Realizing that St. George has traditionally been cowboy oriented, the Lions Club has been actively engaged each year since its formation with the production of a rodeo. This rodeo has evolved into the three-day exciting, action-



EARTHMOVERS LEVEL FLOOR — View looking East over earthmover showing detail of old water course.






VIEW LOOKING SOUTHWEST toward the City Power Plant of rows being formed and gunited.


packed Dixie Roundup which features appearances by world champion cowboys as they vie for purse money and points.

The St. George Lions have not been remise in their support of projects to aid the blind, their support of school and civic projects has been a matter of record in the history of 50 years.

Recognizing the need for a continuing project for the Lions, officers and directors of the club formulated plans for the Dixie Sun Bowl. This was to serve as a multi-purpose sports arena. Foremost in their plans was a rodeo arena of sufficient size to accomodate the annual roundup and rodeo. They felt a college football field and multi-purpose arena could be encompassed in these general plans. One

that could accomodate dance festivals, softball, graduation exercises for college and high school, summer recreation programs and any other large events where large space, adequate seating and lighting are required.

With this in mind the club selected a general committee consisting of Neal Lundberg, Dr. L.W. McGregor, and Les Holcomb acting as the central committee. McGregor was Finance Chairman and Holcomb was Engineer and Construction Superintendent. The club members and other interested help were pressed into action and the Sun Bowl




GUNITE PROCESS — Spraying the seats with the then new process called "Gunite".

was on its way in 1946. The initial phase of the project was completed in time for the Dixie Roundup and Rodeo of 1947.

Specifications for the bowl included dimensions as follows: The floor of the bowl will be 400×208 . The top dimensions will be 463×272 feet. The top of the embankment was 12 feet high. The concrete wall surrounding the football field is 4 feet high with the seats rising directly behind to a height of 13 feet. A total of 14,000 cu. yards of dirt were to be moved.

Initial construction began with the shaping of the bowl with entrances on both the east and west ends. Seats were formed and built with cinderblock risers and cement applied with a new gunite process. Fences and corrals were built, along with chutes and catch pens for rodeo stock. An announcer's stand was built over the chutes. The Dixie College and Dixie High School boys were called in to clear and level the arena as well as clean off the seats and the first show was ready to roll in 1947.

Since that date concession stands have been built on both the North and South sides of the bowl along with rest rooms large enough to handle crowds of six to seven thousand. New ticket booths, entrances, fences, retaining walls, chutes, lights, horse stalls, ramps and miscellaneous other improvements have been added each year.

The initial fund goal was set by the Lions Club at \$30,000.00. The Club had saved a building fund from previous activities of over \$10,000, and in addition pledged each member to a cash contribution of \$100.00. With over one-half of their expected goal already in hand, the club then went to the citizens of the area to ask that they match this amount to build the project. By March 16, 1948, a total contribution for expenses of \$35,574.82 had been made.

Proceeds from rodeos and other activities since that date have gone back into the bowl making possible other improvements. Thousands of dollars in maintenance and endless numbers of work nights have been expended by Lions members to keep the Sun Bowl the facility it is today.

A typical day of an everyday husband and wife usually involves getting up in the morning, having breakfast in a sunny kitchen, then scrambling out of the house to work.


Both halves of the Olson duo got their start in rodeo as small children. Jerry Wayne is proud to be the third generation of contract performers in his family. His grandfather, LaRue Olson, began with a trained buffalo act.

His father, Jerry L. Olson, built his career around a unique team of black Roman riding horses, a renowned buffalo act, a finely tuned clown routine, and outstanding talent in the steer wrestling event. Jerry Wayne, began his career at the tender age of 18 months, taking rides on his father's shoulders as the elder Olson rode his two horses Romanstyle.

Balancing on the backs of horses became an everyday occurance at the Olson house and before long, Jerry was carrying on the tradition with an act of his own. Even before graduation from high school in South Dakota, the talented 17-year-old entertainer had joined the elite ranks of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. Skilled in competitive cowboy events as well, Jerry also competed in steer wrestling during his years in high school and college.

Meanwhile Judy also grew up in a rodeo-oriented family. Her father entertained audiences as a contract clown in the Little Britches Rodeo Association, her older sisters got into the act as trick riders. An Iowa native, Judy started out in Little Britches, America's largest rodeo youth organization. While a member of that group, she captured an all-around senior girls title and the American Junior Rodeo Association's queen crown.

The Olson's will be appearing during each rodeo performance at the Lions Dixie Roundup with Jerry based inside his barrel during the bull riding event, and with both of them together, along with a trio of talented horses. Colorful and professional, they both have plenty of experience as told by the number of years they have both been performing before audiences.





Duane Peters "Rodeo Announcer"



THE EVENTS

Saddle Bronc Riding


Rodeo's oldest event, saddle bronc riding, is an exercise in style and finesse, which demands near-perfect timing. For a qualified ride, the cowboy must spur over the points of the horse's shoulders as the animal's front feet hit the ground, the first jump out of the chute (called "marking him out"). The contestant then uses his upper body for balance, while his feet move in a smooth arc from the horse's neck to a point near the back of the saddle. To score, he must remain mounted for eight seconds.

Two-time World Champion bronc rider Monty "Hawkeye" Henson feels balance is a very important factor. "Saddle bronc riding is more of a balance event than a contest of strength," he explains. "Lifting the rein and spurring aggressively help keep you in the saddle." Hawkeye says it is also important to know where to hold the rein so the horse will not buck the rider over its head and will perform at its best.

In the riding events (saddle bronc, bareback and bull riding) the cowboys can score up to 100 points. Two judges award from one to 25 points each for the rider and the animal. The animal is judged on how hard it bucks, while the cowboy is judged differently for each event. In saddle bronc riding, the rider is judged by how much he spurs, the degree to which his toes are turned out and if he is in control of the horse. The smoother and more rhythmic the ride, the higher he will score.

To compete in saddle bronc riding at a PRCA rodeo, the cowboy must use an Association saddle built with certain specifications on an approved tree. This is required so that it will not be too easy for the

horse to buck off the rider or too easy for the cowboy to stay seated. The rider may use only one hand to hold onto the six-foot, braided rein and his free hand may not touch the animal, any equipment or his person. Bronc riding spurs are relatively dull and the chaps are of light, soft leather and worn snugly around the legs. Dry resin may be applied to the chaps where they come in contact with the swells, or pommel, of the saddle.



Henson is proud he is a saddle bronc rider. "Saddle bronc is the cornerstone of all the other rodeo events," he says. "If we hadn't broken the horses, the ropers wouldn't have anything to ride."

Bareback Riding

Like saddle bronc, bareback riding is a spurring contest, where the cowboy must make an eight-second ride. The contestant must mark the horse out of the chute, as in saddle bronc, but once in the arena the major difference becomes clear: there are no stirrups and no bronc rein for the rider to hang on to. The rigging, a suit-case like handle, is the only thing between the man and the bucking animal. The tremendous strain placed on the riding hand produces a medical phenomenom known as hypertrophy, an enlargement of a bone in the forearm.

Joe Alexander, five-time World Champion in bareback riding, says, "Bareback is the wildest and most physical of all the events. Because of this it is the second most popular event with the fans, next to bull riding." The rider must do more than just use brute strength to stay on the horse if he wants to score well. A short, snappy type of spurring is employed by the cowboy, ranging from the horse's neck to the rigging. The "lick" (spurring motion) in bareback is more abrupt than that of saddle bronc.

Judging in bareback is based on turn-out of the toes, the amount of exposure to the power of the horse, the proficiency of the lick and how much the rider is in control. Like saddle bronc, the rider must not let his free hand touch anything. With only the rigging to hold on to, the cowboy is affected by each movement of the horse. Generally, this causes the bareback ride to appear wilder and less controlled than a saddle bronc ride.

The rigging is obviously the most important piece of the bareback rider's equipment. Mac completely of leather and rawhide, the

rigging fits on the animal's back, specifically over the withers. It measures about two feet in length and must be no more than 10 inches in width at the hand-hold. A leather glove, spurs and usually chaps comprise the remainder of the cowboy's equipment. Resin is allowed on the hand-hold of the rigging and on the glove.



"Alexander the Great" describes what it is like to ride a bareback bronc, "The main thing is to concentrate on getting your rigging set straight and then putting your hand in it so it will stay. You scoot up on the rigging and start to think about spurring him out. After that its timing and just trying to stay on the animal. If you really concentrate you can stay ahead of the horse and stay in control."

Bull Riding

There is something awe inspiring about watching a cowboy on top of a writhing, massive bull for an eight second ride and the escape is equally impressive. Donnie Gay, winner of the World Championship in bull riding four times, finds this a unique aspect of his event. "In bull riding," Donnie explains, "you are not done when you get off the bull; you still have to make your escape." The cowboy is protected and aided in his effort to get away from the bull by a bullfighter. The matador in baggy pants distracts the unpredictable bull from fallen cowboys and frees any riders that get hung up in their bull ropes.

A bull bucks differently than a horse, so a bull rider must be prepared for the downward thrust, as the animal tries to throw the cowboy over his head. Donnie puts it this way, "You are holding on to 1,400 to 1,600 pounds of an animal going in different directions, with nothing but a bull rope to hold on to." The toughest bulls to ride are the ones that spin when they buck. While on the bull, the rider's free hand must not come in contact with the bull, any equipment or the rider himself, as in the other riding events.

The factor judges consider most important in bull riding is control. This means a cowboy who stays upright throughout the ride will be given a higher score than one who is hanging off the side for part of the ride. Extra points are awarded for spurring, although it is not required. Again, turn-out of the toes figures into the score. For a qualified ride, the cowboy must have a hold on the rope and not have touched the ground with any part of his body, when the whistle sounds.

The bull rope is the primary piece of equipment for the bull rider. This rope has been unraveled and then plaited flat, with a hand hold.

A bell is attached to the bottom of the rope and, after the cowboy turns the rope loose, it falls off the bull due to the weight of the bell. A leather glove and spurs round out the bull rider's accounterments. Resin is used on both the rope and glove.



Donnie Gay reveals the respect he has for the animals he rides. "When you climb over the chute to get on the bull, you need to have complete concentration on the animal that you have drawn. You have to be ready to react to whatever the bull does," he says. While he sits on the bull with his hand in the hand hold, the champion rider has a friend help him tighten the rope. Then Gay scoots forward on the rope as far as possible, so he can maintain maximum leverage and control while he rides. Once he gives the nod, the chute swings open and its man versus bull.

Calf Roping

Calf roping is one of rodeo's earliest events, evolving directly from work on the range. A timed contest, the calf gets a designated head start on the cowboy, who cannot leave the roping box until the animal has tripped a barrier. If the roper "breaks the barrier," a 10-second penalty is added to his time. After the cowboy ropes the calf, he must dismount, run down the rope and "flank" the animal from a standing position. Once the calf is on the ground, the competitor crosses three feet and ties them together with a pigging string. When the tie is completed the cowboy throws his hands in the air and the clock is stopped.

Eight-time World Champion calf roper Dean Oliver feels that the horse a cowboy uses for roping is extremely important. Dean explains, "It's kind of like Will Rogers said, 'A good horse, to a roper, is 75 percent of his winning ability.' If a roper doesn't have a horse that fits his style, he'll never be able to win up to his ability." Roping horses must be very quick and are trained to follow the calf and stop instantly once the calf has been roped. While the cowboy is tieing the calf, the horse backs up to keep the rope taut.

In timed events no score is given by the judges and the winner is chosen on the basis of the fastest time. The tie that the roper uses must include at least one wrap and a half-hitch and must be completed in 35 seconds. When the tie is finished, the cowboy remounts and rides forward to slack the rope. The calf must remain tied for six seconds or the roper receives "no time." Any time under nine seconds is considered a very good run.

Other than the horse, a rope and pigging string are the most important rhings a cowboy needs in calf roping. The rope, which is tied to the saddle, is made of hemp and is about three-eighths of an inch in diameter and 25 feet long. A smaller line, called a pigging string, is used to tie the calf's legs. About six feet in length and a quarter inch thick, the pigging string is carried in the roper's mouth with the tail tucked in his jeans. Since the roper usually travels with his horse, he must have a horse trailer and a good supply of feed for the animal.



Dean Oliver admits there is a very special relationship between the roper and his horse. He says, "Horses are like people, some are smooth and others aren't. In my lifetime I've had about 20 roping horses, but there have only been two that I felt comfortable with." His favorite horse was a sorrel gelding named Mickey. Although Oliver paid \$2,500 for the horse, he was more than reimbursed by the numerous titles he won roping with Mickey.



Steer Wrestling

It takes two people for steer wrestling, a hazer to keep the steer running straight ahead and the wrestler to twist the steer to the ground. From the back of a horse, the cowboy leaps on to the steer's horns while the animal is on the run and wrestles it to the arena floor. As in calf roping, a barrier is used and a 10-second penalty is assessed for breaking the barrier. Time is called when the steer's head and feet are free and pointing in the same direction.

The hazer can play a major role in the success of the steer wrestler according to three-time World Champion Roy Duvall. He says, "This is the only event where you have a man helping you in the arena who is not competing at that time. I try to have my brother haze if I can. The hazer plays an important part, because if he's not where he's supposed to be, you can't get the steer." When the hazer does his job properly, the steer will be positioned near the wrestler's horse, so he can slip out of the saddle and on to the horns. The bulldogger wraps his arms around the horns with a hold resembling a full-nelson. By planting his feet on the ground, he slides the steer to a stop before bringing him to the ground.

This event is also decided by the quickest time, but it is up to the judges to determine if the catch is legal and when the clock is stopped. A good time is under 4.5 seconds. If the steer gets free the wrestler is only allowed to take one step to catch the animal. He is also forbidden from placing his fingers in the eyes, lips or nose of the steer.

Very little special equipment is used in this contest. The bulldogger must furnish his own horse and hazer, but his body is the main piece of "equipment." This is an event which requires both timing and strength. A cowboy who wrestles steers is usually big and powerful,



but since he depends on a combination of strength and leverage, smaller cowboys can make good competitors, too. Duvall adds, "In the last three or four years the steers have been getting smaller and the little guys have the advantage." "Smaller" cattle is in the 400 pound range, while the larger steers can weigh up to 750 pounds.

Team Roping

The secret to team roping is teamwork: between the two cowboys who are roping and between the ropers and their horses. The steer is caught, while on the run, by the header who loops a rope around the animal's horns and dallies his rope (wraps it around the saddle horn). Immediately the heeler ropes both hind feet while the steer is still in an upright position and dallies his rope. Then the cowboys turn their horses so they face each other to "shape the steer." Occasionally a Tie-Face-Option is employed and the ropers are allowed to tie their ropes to the saddle horn. There is a 10-second penalty if the barrier is broken and a five-second penalty if the heeler only ropes one foot.

This event is especially popular in the western states where it originated. Team roping is required in California, Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico and Oregon, unless the rodeo offers steer roping. In that part of the country team roping is a part of the cowboy's work. Four-time World Champion team roper Leo Camarillo is a native Californian. "I utilize team roping skills on my own ranch," says Leo. "It's a challenge to catch an unbroken animal in a humane way." Camarillo is a heeler and enjoys his part of the contest. "The heeling process is an art form; it is never the same with two steers," he explains.

Judges, while not assigning scores, do determine if the steer is roped legally and if the header has dallied his rope and turned the steer before the heeler catches the hind legs. For a legal catch the rope must be either around both horns, around half of the head or around the neck. Before time is called the horses must be facing each other and the ropes must be tight. The cowboys are only allowed to carry one rope apiece, but the team is permitted three throws in all. Any time under seven seconds is a good run.

The ropers must provide their own horses and rope. The specifications of the rope depend on the individual, but it is usually a little less than the an inch thick and can be soft, medium or hard. Sometimes the header wears a leather glove on his right hand to prevent rope burns when he dallies the rope to stop the steer. As in the other timed events, horses play an important role in team roping. Well trained and suited to fast handling, the mounts can make or break a roping team.



Camarillo feels strongly about the significance of the horses. He says, "The more you can work in one unit, the easier it is to excell. You have to try to recognize the horse's leads, so you can coordinate the timing between horse and rider. It is a very similar situation to when you're showing a horse." Team roping is definitely an event of partnership, partnership of more than one kind.

Tom Ferguson

Probably on his way to becoming prorodeo's first million dollar winner, Tom Ferguson says, "I want to be the best cowboy of my time." With that attitude and exceptional skill, Ferguson has set numerous records since joining the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association in 1972.

Over the past 12 years, Ferguson's annual arena earnings have averaged over \$73,000. At that rate, and with career winnings of \$876,686, he could cross the million dollar mark within two years. Perhaps Ferguson's best-known accomplishment is his attainment of six consecutive all-around world championships (Larry Mahan is the only other cowboy to win a total of six). But the list of Ferguson's records goes on — most money won at a regular season rodeo (\$17,225 at Houston in 1982); tie for fastest steer wrestling single run at National Finals Rodeo (3.5 seconds in 1975); fastest steer wrestling time on ten head at NFR (65.8 seconds in 1977); and he's one of only four cowboys ever to qualify for the National Finals in three events in one year (calf roping, steer wrestling and steer roping in 1979).

In addition, Ferguson won world championships in steer wrestling in 1977 and 1978, and in calf roping in 1974. At age 33, Ferguson says, "I plan to go after it (the world all-around championship) again for my own personal satisfaction. Realistically, I figure I have three or four more good years left in rodeo. If I have the opportunity, I'll be there at 40, but we'll just have to wait and see."
