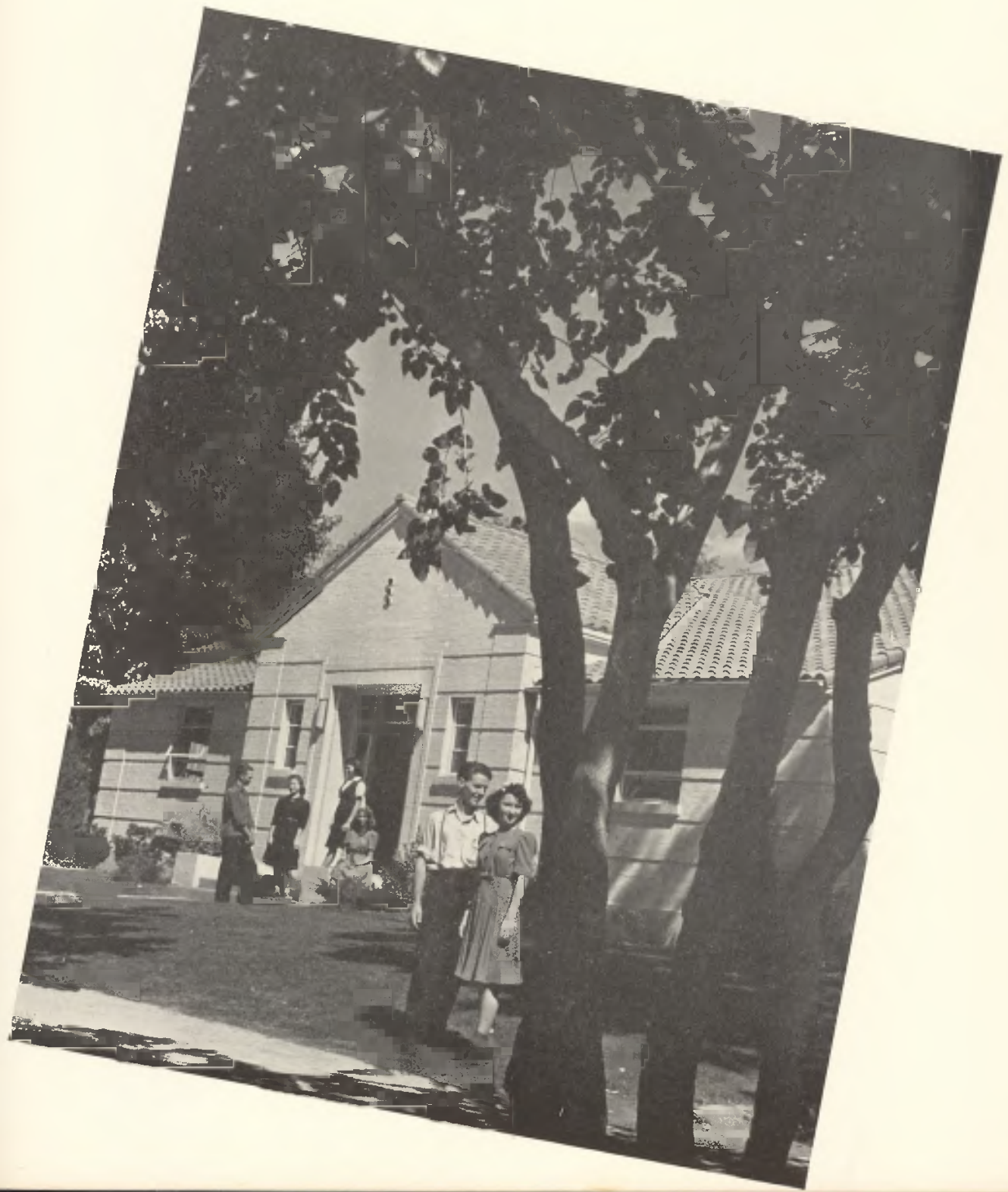


# DEDICATION
