Richard R. Kohler is an architect/historian, currently serving as president of the Washington County Historical Society. He received a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from the University of Utah and a Master of Architecture from the University of Hawaii, completing postgraduate studies at Harvard University. Richard and his wife, Jennifer, are involved with the DOCUTAH film festival held each September in St. George, Utah. Richard serves on the Washington County Recreation Arts and Parks Advisory Board. He is the author of a number of community planning studies. His most recent book, "***The Town Lot: A Little Piece of Zion,***" was published in 2013. Previously, "***St. George: Outpost of Civilization***" was published in 2011, celebrating the sesquicentennial of the founding of St. George by Mormon Colonists in 1861.

Richard Kohler's architectural practice www.kohler-architecture.com is geographically and technically diverse, ranging from Park City, Utah to Las Vegas, Nevada. He has designed custom homes, lodging, resorts, resort communities, shops, shopping centers, city halls, county courthouses, schools, churches, parks, trails, pavilions, even chicken coops. Energy, water, and landscape conservation, together with historic preservation, have shaped his unique approach to the art of design.
