Tim Martin's presentation at the St. George Tabernacle on Monday, March 3rd will answer "Why isn't nuclear power solving America's energy problems?"

While at the US Naval Academy, **Tim Martin** began studying nuclear power when it was "new stuff" just 19 years after the first atom bombs were dropped. Since then, he has driven nuclear submarines and been a consultant to every nuclear plant in the US and many in Germany, Japan, England, Canada, and South Africa. Starting with the evolution of nuclear power, including nuclear submarines and nuclear power plants, Tim will touch on Three Mile Island and Chernobyl, and explain why no commercial nuclear plants are currently being built in the US. He will also explain what is happening with nuclear fusion, small modular reactors, and what the future of nuclear power may hold for all of us.

Tim Martin and his wife, Deanna Dutton, were high school sweethearts in Las Vegas, and finally married when Tim graduated with distinction from the US Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland with an engineering degree that he later supplemented with an MBA from George Washington University. In the Navy, Tim drove two nuclear submarines - first a Polaris missile sub carrying "Boomer" and a "Fast Attack" sub that chased Russian submarines during the Cold War. After eight years in the Navy, Tim was an engineer with Exxon Co, USA, and then joined NUTECH, a nuclear engineering consulting firm where he became licensed as a Professional Engineer. In 1986 he formed his own management consulting company serving every nuclear plant in the US and many large electric power companies for over 15 years.

In 2001, Tim sold his consulting firm when he and Deanna were called as mission president to serve in the Philippines Naga Mission. One month after being released as mission president, Tim was called as Director of the St. George Visitors' Center and Historic Sites. He currently serves on the St. George Communication Council with Deanna where they established the St. George Interfaith Council 15 years ago. Tim and Deanna have six children, 24 grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren.
