

# ST GEORGE CITY

## HISTORIC GRANARIES AND FIELD GUIDE



St. George is at the core of a booming metropolitan area. Tremendous development pressure has resulted in the subdivision and re-development of the remnants of most of the 8/10-acre lots in the original village center, and the loss of historic landscapes, buildings and structures that distinguished it as a Mormon settlement. Many people in St. George, including lifelong residents, are unaware of the existence of the historic granaries. The few adobe granaries remaining in St. George have been adapted to other uses, from storage sheds to living quarters. The condition of the granaries varies from severely neglected to fully restored.

This brochure is part of a larger project to document what is left of the historic landscapes and structures within the core of St. George.



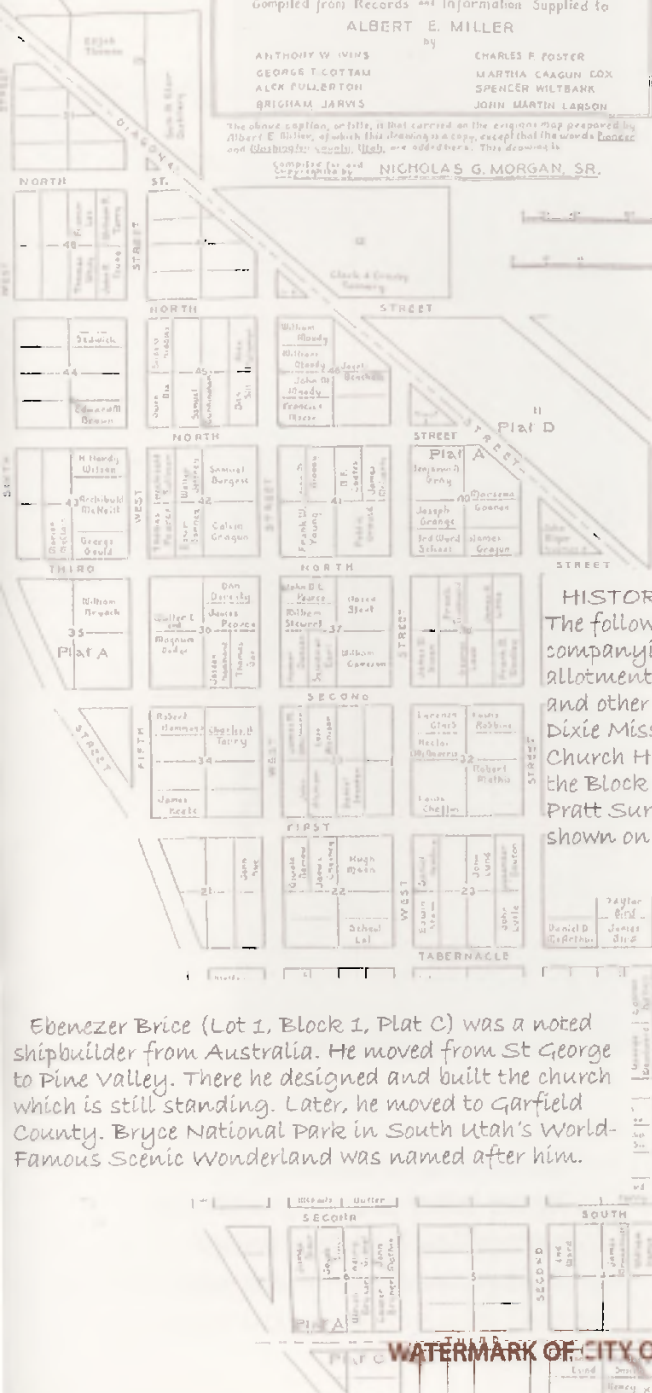
PIONEER MAP

St George blocks are 32 rods (528ft) square, with each divided into 8 lots 8x 16 rods in size. The lots are numbered clockwise, commencing at the south-east corner, as shown here on blocks 9 and 10, Plat "C". The principal streets are 90 feet wide and intersect at right angles except as shown on the drawing.

**HISTORICAL**  
 The following Mormon Pioneers, most of whom are listed in the accompanying name index, first received their "inheritance", or land allotments, in Great Salt Lake City and later emigrated to St George and other settlements in Washington County Utah-known as the Dixie Mission. The list is compiled by Albert E. Miller of St George, Church Historian. The number placed before each name here indicates the Block Number in which the inheritance was located in the Orson Pratt Survey of Great Salt Lake City, completed in August 1847, as shown on the Nicholas G. Morgan Sr. map.

Ebenezer Brice (Lot 1, Block 1, Plat C) was a noted shipbuilder from Australia. He moved from St George to Pine Valley. There he designed and built the church which is still standing. Later, he moved to Garfield County. Bryce National Park in South Utah's World-Famous Scenic Wonderland was named after him.
