Dear Friends,

We were all sorry you did not get up to the meeting recently. Dr. LeCompte says "your old Bus" lacked power to climb the hill. He stated further, that you were anxious to have something "in black and white" from us to the effect that we would not count the time against you, (or rather your lease,) that has been lost, due to our not having our title in proper shape to allow you to proceed with safety to drill, and otherwise explore our Wyoming ground for oil.

We want to say to you and all your friends and stockholders that it is certainly the sense of our Company and has been so decided in our directors' meetings, that your lease will be extended for a time equal to the time our title has been or may be in question.

To give an example: Our title to the ground was brought into question the 24th day of last Feb., and since then, we could not give our permission for you to go on the ground to explore for oil. Suppose our title to all, or the major portion of the ground leased to your Company is cleared on March 24th next. Then your lease would be extended 13 months in time, and we would not expect you to pay rent, or meet the terms of the lease, that were to be specifically performed by your Company between Feb. 24th, 1920, and March 24th, 1921.
