Draper Man's

Rites Set

For Tuesday

DRAPER—Funeral services for Printess Fitzgerald, 56, Draper, who died Friday in a Salt Lake hospital following a cerebral hemorrhage, will be conducted



Tuesday in Draper Second Ward chapel, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by Bishop Otis A. Pierce.

Burial will be in Draper City Cemetery. Mr. Fitzgerald had been in ill health for three

Mr. Fitzgerald years.

The time of the services will be announced later.

Mr. Fitzgerald was principal of schools in Junction, Piute County, and Annabelle, Sevier County. He was also a prominent dairy farmer at Draper for many years.

He was born April 16, 1892, in Draper, a son of J. W. W. and Leah J. Day Fitzgerald. His parents were members of two prominent pioneer families of Utah.

Mr. Fitzgerald was educated in Draper public schools, graduating from Jordan High School. He attended the University of Utah and Utah State Agriculture College and taught school in Junction and Annabelle, where he became principal.

He was married to Beatrice Murphy of Woodland, in the Salt Lake Temple, Sept. 1, 1915. She died Oct. 23, 1916. He served 18 months overseas in World War I, and when he returned Feb. 27, 1920, he was married to Jane Kimball of Draper, in the Salt Lake Temple. She died April 27, 1932. On March 27, 1935, he was married to Ruth Anderson in the Salt Lake Temple.

Survivors, besides his widow, include eight sons, Printess K., Gerald, J. Walter, Paul, Crozier K., Nephi R., P. Glenn Fitzgerald, Draper, and Bliss G. Fitzgerald, serving a mission for the Church to the northwestern states; five daughters, Mrs. Gail Hill, Betty Ruth and Orene Fitzgerald, Draper; Mrs. Jane Maydell Elswood, Sandy, and Mrs. Leah Smith, Logan; two brothers, Walter D. and R. D. Fitzgerald, Salt Lake City; three sisters, Mrs. Or-tence Jensen, Draper; Mrs. Alta Andrus Aylett and Mrs. Agnes Rasmussen, Sandy, and eight grandchildren.
