

Jeremiah Francis “Jerry” Deady

Jeremiah Francis “Jerry” Deady was born 25 December 1844 in Castlegregory, County Kerry, Ireland. He was the oldest of nine children of Robert Deady and Honor F Francis. The family immigrated to American about 1850. On the 1860 and 1865 censuses, Jerry and his family were living in Chicopee, Hampden, Massachusetts.¹

By 1880, Jerry had moved to Silver Reef, Washington, Utah Territory, where he worked as a miner.² He married Mrs Hannah Goddard Pace Woodard on 15 March 1887 in Pinto Precinct, Washington, Utah Territory.³ Hannah already had five children, ages two to thirteen, from previous marriages. Jeremiah and Hannah had four children together; the oldest was born in Silver Reef. In 1888, Jerry was called as a grand juror in the Beaver Court for cohabitation cases.⁴

Jerry applied for naturalization on 10 April 1890 in Beaver, Beaver, Utah Territory. The family moved to Panguitch, Garfield, Utah Territory, for a few years before moving to Harrisburg, Washington, Utah Territory.⁵ Jerry operated an arrastra (a revolving stone, powered by water, used to crush ore) further down the Quail Creek channel.⁶ Jerry died 25 November 1894 in Pinto, Washington, Utah Territory. He was buried in the Washington City Cemetery. He left a wife and seven children, ages two to twenty.⁷ The Deadys were one of the last families to live in Harrisburg.⁸

After Jerry died, Hannah moved away from Harrisburg.⁹ In 1900, Hannah was living with six children and two grandchildren in Kanarra, Iron, Utah.¹⁰ She married again in 1908 in Salt Lake City, Salt Lake, Utah. In 1910, she was living with her husband and three stepchildren in Albion, Cassia, Idaho.¹¹ On the 1920 and 1930 censuses, she was living with her husband and stepson in Washington City, Washington, Utah.¹² She died in 1839 in Washington City and was buried with her fourth husband in the city cemetery.

Hannah Maria Goddard Pace Woodard Deady Jolley

Hannah Maria Goddard was born 16 May 1856 in Santaquin, Utah, Utah Territory. She was the third of seven children of William Pettibone Goddard and Mary Ann Pace.¹³ In 1860, the family was living in Payson, Utah, Utah Territory, where her father was a farmer.¹⁴ On the 1870 census, Hannah was living with her mother and two brothers in New Harmony, Washington, Utah Territory. Hannah married William Harvey Pace in 1874 in Santaquin, Utah, Utah Territory (they were third cousins). They had three children, one who died as an infant. Her husband, age 25, died in 1879 in Panguitch,

Garfield, Utah Territory. Hannah married Francis Jedediah Woodard in 1882 in Santaquin. They had two sons and he died at age 33 in 1885 in Panguitch. By 1888, they were in Silver Reef, Washington, Utah Territory, where the first of their four children were born.

Hannah died 27 November 1939 in Washington City and was buried next to her fourth husband in the city cemetery. Her daughter Florence said that people came to Hannah and she pulled their teeth, cut their hair, and helped deliver babies. Her daughter Irene said that all the half siblings were very close and visited each other often.¹⁵

Hannah married Jeremiah Francis Deady in 1887 in Pinto, Washington, Utah Territory.¹⁶ The family moved to Panguitch, Garfield, Utah Territory, for a few years before moving to Harrisburg, Washington, Utah Territory.¹⁷ Jerry operated an arrastra (a revolving stone, powered by water, used to crush ore) further down the Quail Creek channel.¹⁸ Jerry died 25 November 1894 in Pinto, Washington, Utah Territory. Hannah Deady

Hannah Deady was born 17 December 1888 in Silver Reef, Washington, Utah Territory. She was the oldest of four children of Jeremiah Deady and Hannah Maria Goddard. In 1890, the family moved to Panguitch, Garfield, Utah Territory, for a few years before moving to Harrisburg, Washington, Utah Territory, about 1894.²⁵ Her father died when Hannah was six years old. In 1900, Hannah was one of eight children living with her mother in Kanarra, Iron, Utah.²⁶

Hannah married Ludwig Albert Tomsik in 1908 in Salt Lake City. They had eight children. Hannah was trained as a teacher and taught in Leeds while she lived in Harrisburg.²⁷ Her little family moved to Salt Lake City by 1910, where her husband worked for the railroad.²⁸ By 1920, the family of five children had moved to Washington City, Washington, Utah, where Albert was a laborer for hire.²⁹ On the 1930 census, Hannah was living with her husband and seven children in Star, Beaver, Utah. Ludwig was a car inspector for the railroad.³⁰

Ludwig died in 1939 in Las Vegas and was buried in the Woodlawn Cemetery. Hannah and three children lived to Las Vegas, Clark, Nevada in 1940. She died 26 September 1952 in Henderson, Clark, Nevada, and was buried next to her husband.
