Dunyon and Mrs. Arthur E. Graham from Salt Lake county, H. W. Lunt of state road commission and the bridge engineer (did not catch name.)

After music by the Dixie orchestra, Pres. Joseph K. Nicholes offered the dedicatory prayer. All joined in singing "America," led by the orch-estra. Address of welcome was made by Senator Hirschi.

Mayor C. C. Neslin made a happy little talk in which he conveyed the congratulations of Salt Lake to Dixie this great accomplishmentroad and bridge.

"Pioneer Trail Blazers," the subject intended for Anthony W. Ivins, was very ably handled by Hon. Edw. H. Snow, as Pres. Ivins could not be present. Mr. Snow referred to the earliest white man known to have traveled in this section, Father Escalante. Indian traditation has it that he preached to the Indians from the top of Schnob Kiab (God's Hill) a hill near here. He recalled the travels of Fremont through this gorge in 1843 and extolled the efforts of that intrepid pioneer Jedediah Smith in whose company was Thomas Virgin, later killed by the Indians, and after whom the Virgin river was named. Peter Skeene Ogden, Sublette were also trappers mentiond. Mr. Snow paid tribute to the dom of the pathfinders who had located the original road over the very path now selected by the modern engineers. The speaker paid high tribute to former Governor William Spry, saying he was the pioneer govof Utah to give stimulius to ernor road building in Dixie. Praise was also extended to subsequent govercommissioners for and road good work along this line.

President Grant spoke on beauty of Utah scenery and what this

road means in connection therewith. Mr. Finch spoke on road problems especially all-year-round roads, was interested in putting road through

Zion Canyon to Mt. Carmel.

Bishop Frei gave a splendid talk on the economic value of the road. Told of traveling over this road when as a boy of eight years he accompanihis father, a pioneer, carrying a cowbell in advance of his father's wagon so that two wagons should not meet in a dangerous place. Frei gave some remarkable figures showing what his town, Santa Clara, had accomplished in the way of mar-

keting fruit and vegetables.
Randall L. Jones gave statistics of Zion Park travel, showing the great increase in the past year. Mr. Jones said the Union Pacific predicted 50,-

000 people would come in 1926. Regrets were expressed from Governor Dern, former Governor Spry, President A. W. Ivins and Dan S.

Spencer that they could not be here. Hearty applause greeted each of the speakers.

An abundance of lucious melons, grapes, pears, peaches, apples and other fruit was spread out on tables to which everybody helped themselves. This was furnished free by the different towns, and there was enough left over to have fed another crowd nearly as big.
