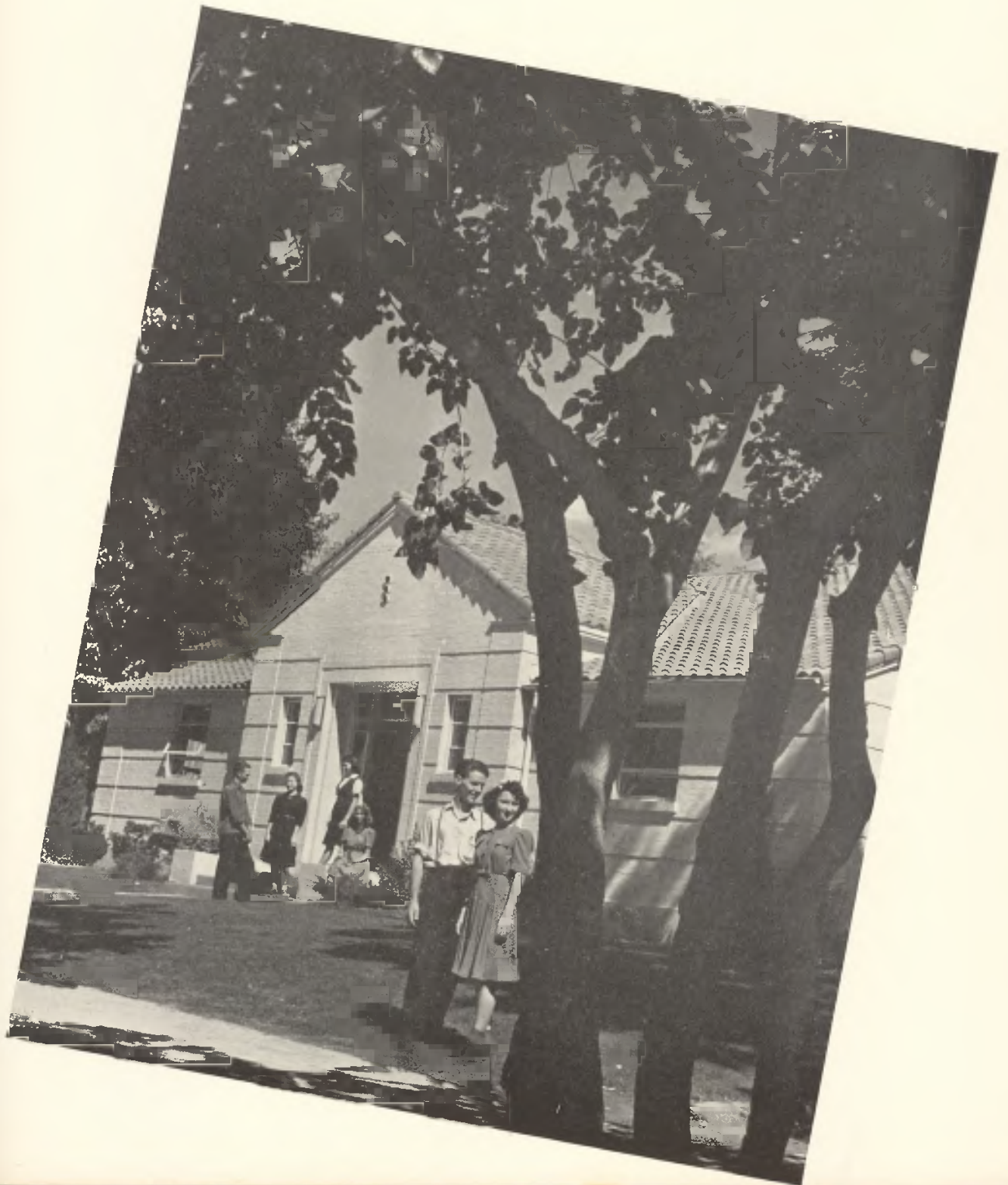




# DEDICATION

We especially wish to thank the student body and faculty for their splendid cooperation, and our sponsor, Mr. Peterson, for his guidance in helping us to give you The Dixie.

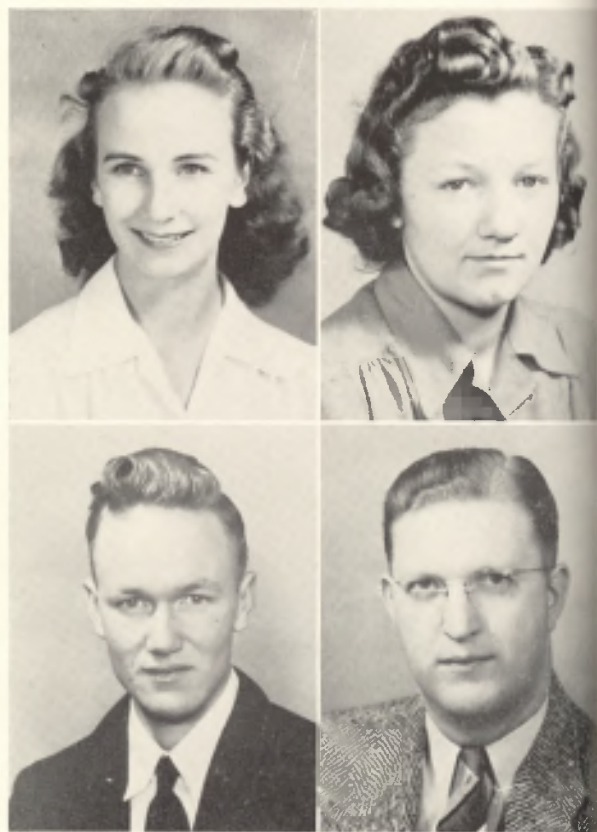

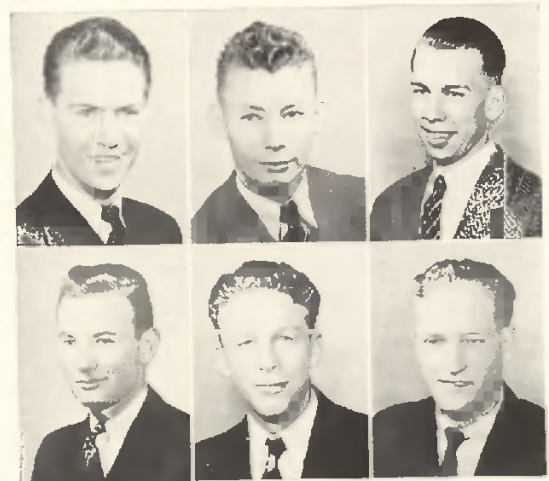

This year we took four teams on a ten-day tour of California, debating at Redlands University, Bakersfield and Stockton junior colleges. We entered a tri-state meet at "The College of the Pacific" at Stockton, and although 58 teams and 15 Utah, Nevada, and California schools were entered, our Dixie squad won a higher percentage than any other out-of-state school represented.

During the year we have also been host to debate teams from Brigham Young University, Snow Junior College, and Ouchita College of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, meeting these teams in no-decision practice debates.

We also successfully conducted a high school debate meet here on March 14, in which the college debaters had a chance to hear debates from the judges' chair.

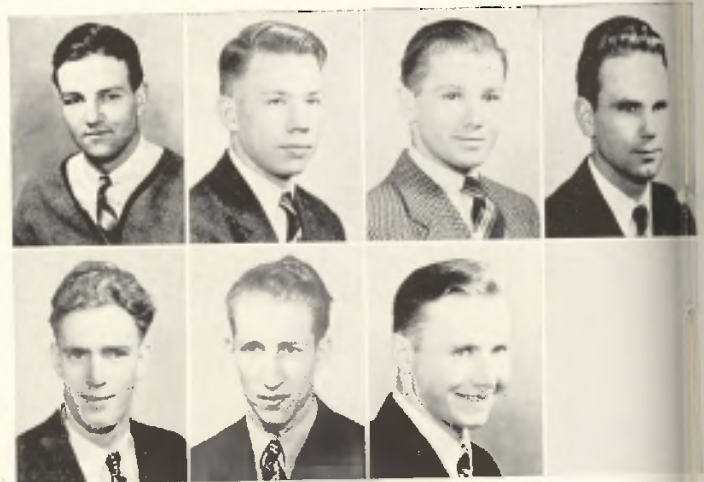

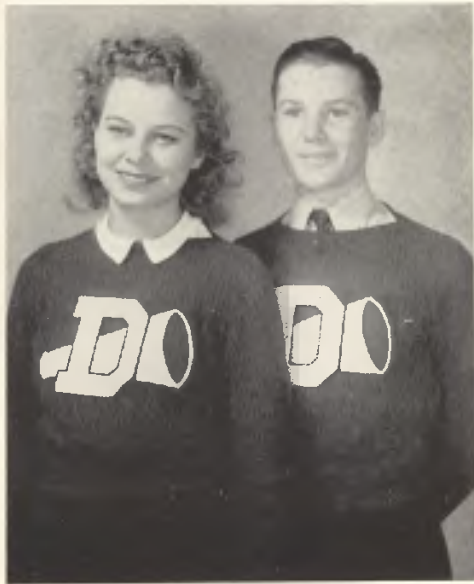

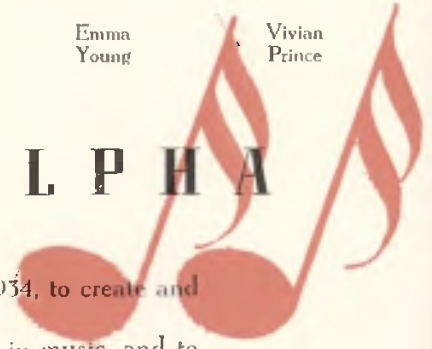
