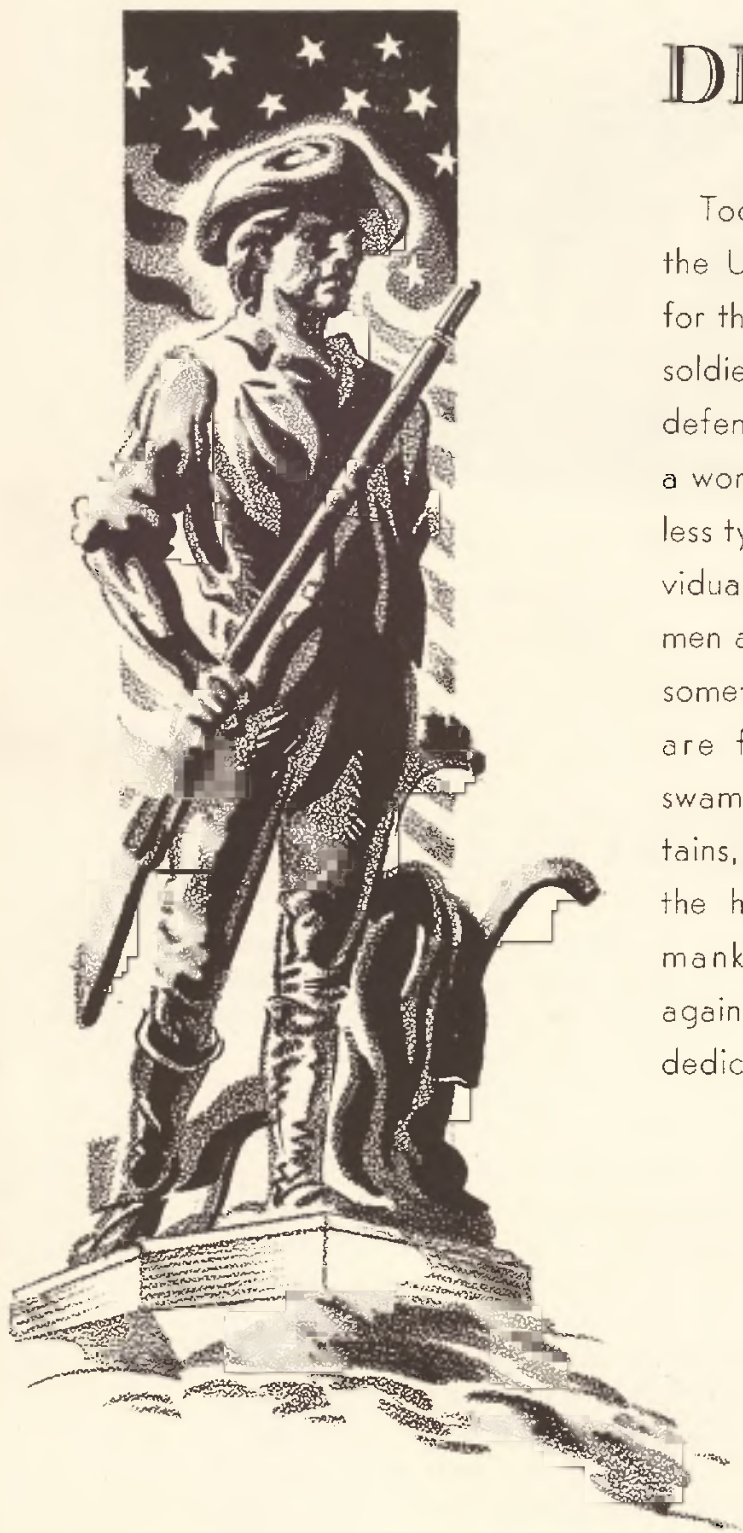
And we who have done our small part to "keep the home fires burning," will welcome them and stand ready to serve with them in building a better world of peace.

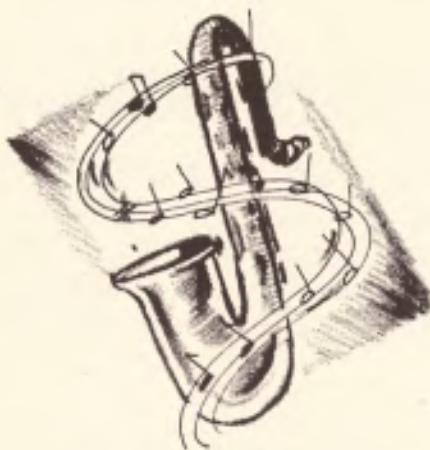
## “DIXIE’S TOP HATTERS”

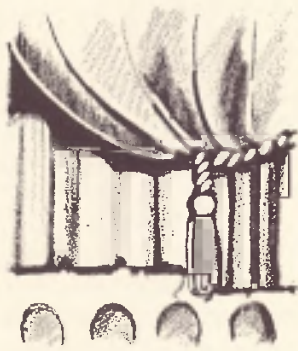
## "BROTHER GOOSE"

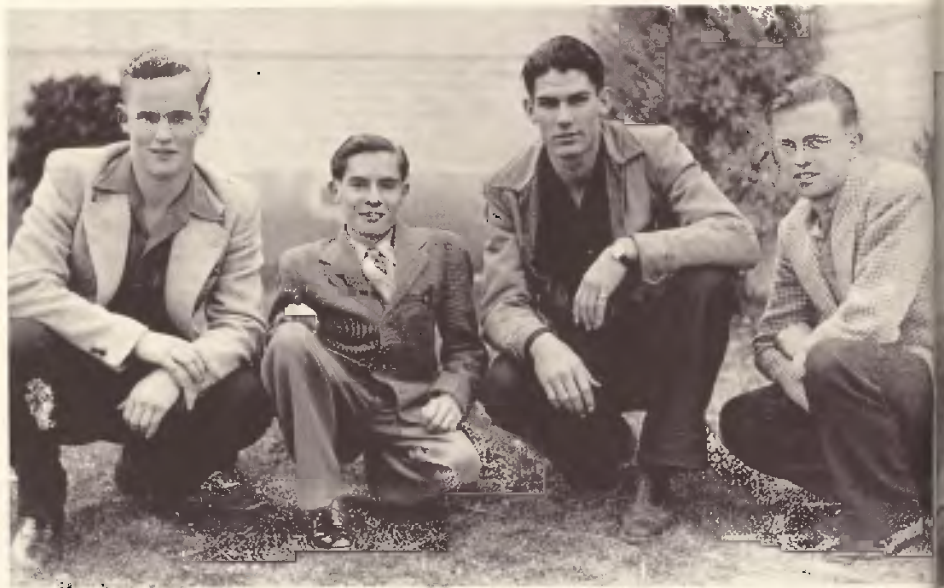


## HIGH SCHOOL DEBATE

# BASKETBALL


