
DIXIE . . . "OUR PLACE IN THE SUN."

When the Civil War threatened a shortage of cotton goods in the West, Brigham Young sent 300 families to southwestern Utah to raise cotton and build a factory for manufacturing cloth. This colonization, which began in 1861, is a historic epic in hardship and struggle. The combination of semi-tropical climate and cotton raising caused early settlers to refer to the area as Utah's Dixie — hence the name Dixie College. When it began operation in 1911, the school was officially called the St. George State Academy, but it was soon nick-named "Dixie Academy." In 1916 the name was officially changed to Dixie Normal School. In 1922 it became Dixie Jr. College, and in 1970, Dixie College.



THE "D" — On the morning of February 19, the class of 1915 gathered together to lay, shape whitewash this "D," located on the black hill west of St. George. The "D" can be distinguished to thirty miles.






Troughout the valley, the white DIXIE was placed on the vermillion cliff by the first and Dixe College and has become symbolic of the entire area.

THE CITY OF ST. GEORGE - St. George, Utah was officially settled on March 2, 1862.







OUR SUNNY SURROUNDING





SNOW CANYON — Snow Canyon is a geological paradise where magestic canyon walls of rec sandstone cradle ancient lava flows. It was first




ELONG TUNNEL — The west entrance of the mile long tunnel in Zion National Park.




WEST TEMPLE — The West Temple at Zion Park.

ST. GEORGE L.D.S. TEMPLE — It was in a remote area referred to as "Utah's Dixie," in the beautiful, desert oasis community of St. George, that the first Mormon temple in Utah was completed.

When challenged to build a temple, the Saints from a wide surrounding area responded generously by contributing tithes and by donating labor.

It was necessary to dig a deep drainage canal and haul in thousands of tons of black, volcanic rock to create a solid foundation. However, under the watchful care of the construction superintendent, Miles P. Romney, the work progressed steadily

LANDMARKS

TABERNACLE — The St. George Mormon Tabernacle was the first public building in town. The building was started in 1863 and the final stone was laid Dec. 29, 1871. It is built of red sandstone; each block was hand cut for its special place, as were the patterned caps over the doors and windows.

The workmen laid up outside walls of red sandstone from the tabernacle quarry and plastered them with coatings of white stucco. Teamsters hauled lumber 80 miles by oxcart from Mt. Trumball's steam sawmill and from other pineries. Carpenters fastened heavy hand hewn timbers with wooden pegs for roof beams, and skilled craftsmen fashioned spiral staircases and carved the delicate interior woodwork.










