

Grand Opening For Hurricane Hi Slated For Friday, Nov. 6

**Building Fills Long Needed
Gap in Educational Facil-
ities; Many Rooms, Fine
Library and Gymnasium.**

Hurricane, Utah, October 27.—Plans for the opening of the Hurricane High school are announced by Principal L. B. Bennett for Friday, November 6 at 9 p. m. Patrons and friends are invited to make a tour of the building, under the direction of teachers, is promised those who attend.

The building, which is a two story T shaped structure, constructed of maroon colored brick which were made locally, fills a big gap in the educational facilities of this community. For years the class rooms have been crowded beyond capacity, making it impossible to give the children the educational advantages enjoyed by other better equipped districts, declare school authorities.

One hundred and ten thousand dollars, forty-five per cent of which was furnished by the government, was required to finance the building. This is one of three school buildings built in Washington county during the summer under the P. W. A. The Hurricane building is composed of eight class rooms, besides two large halls, principal's office and supply room, kitchen, dining and sewing rooms, library, chemistry laboratory and supply room, band and instrument rooms, type writing and bookkeeping rooms, student body officers room, girls' rest room, dressing rooms and gymnasium.

The classrooms are spacious and well lighted with unavents for heating and air conditioning. The walls are equipped with fine blackboards and celotex borders for art display.

The principal's office has a sound system that enables him to give or receive immediate information from any of the classrooms, gymnasium or outdoors. He also has a three bell and buzzer system to the rooms.

The halls are large light and airy with ample space for 150 double lockers.

The kitchen has individual work tables and electric hot plates in addition to an electric stove and refrigerator. In the dining room is a dining suite. The sewing room has a triple mirror alcove.

The gymnasium, finest south of Provo, is 55 feet by 85 feet and will seat 1,400 persons. The stage adjoining is unusually large and is hung with a velvet curtain and cyclorama, opposite which is a perfectly equipped projection room. The floor of the gymnasium is of maple. There are four double-door exits to this auditorium. The shower rooms, for the boys and girls have nine showers and a foot bath in each. The dressing rooms are done in tile.

The library is 28x36 feet. It has two dozen especially made library chairs. The window blinds

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are made of heavy translucent linen.

The chemistry room provides a demonstration desk for the instructor and individual experiment desks for the students.

The girls lounge is furnished with day beds and study tables. This room is to be used also by the school nurse.

The music room is sound proof, because of the acoustic plaster used in finishing it.

The new high school will include students from the seventh to the twelfth grade. The student body numbers 375. The faculty consists of twelve members with Mr. Bennett as principal. He has issued an invitation to the Zion Park Stake to hold their November quarterly conference in the new auditorium.
