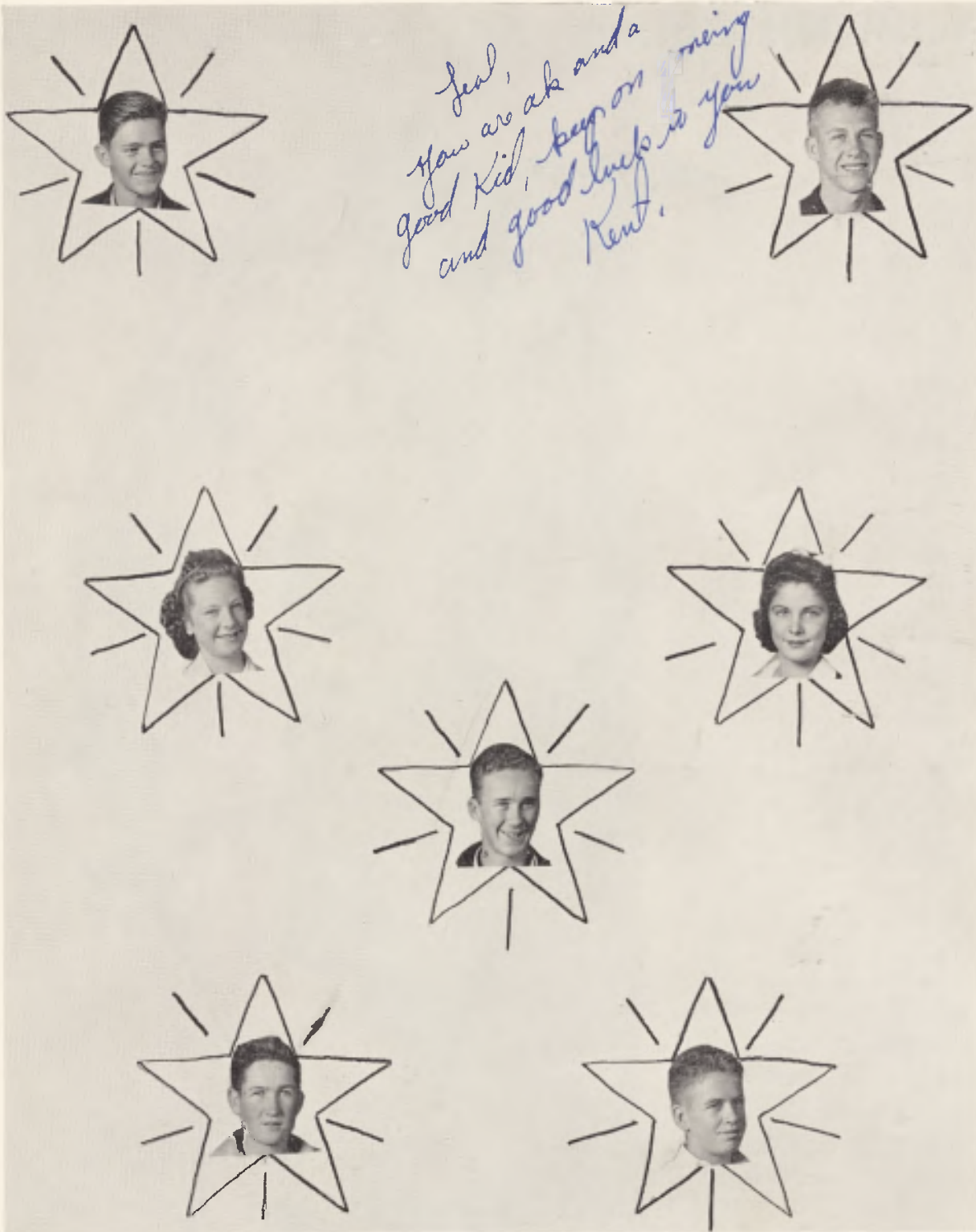

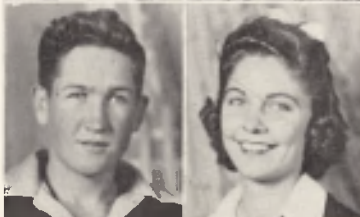

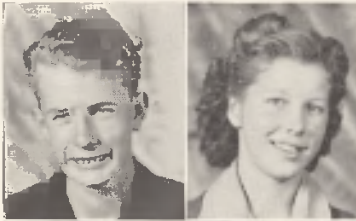

Two things he doesn't like; history tests and girls.

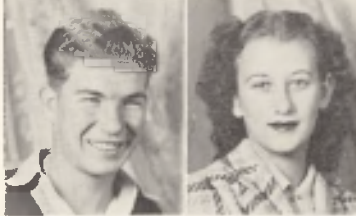


MARY GUBLER

Believes that "swing" was invented for him alone.

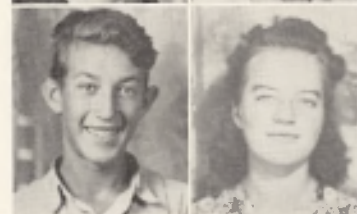
